## President

My term as president of AB Women's Ministries of MA is coming to an end. I thought about our mission statement and reflected on my experience as an AB woman. I was in my mid 30's when my pastor's wife introduced AB Women's Ministries to the women in the church, which resulted in our starting a women's ministry. Three years later I attended my first AB Women's Ministries of MA conference in Holyoke, MA. I was shy and felt uncomfortable being with a large group of women I did not know. The women were welcoming, and many were encouraging and supportive. When I felt overwhelmed and wanted to sit by myself and observe I could do so. The first time I was asked to share about my church's women's ministries missions I kept my head down while my voice cracked, and my knees shook.

Over the next 30+ years I served as AB Women's Ministries of MA Scholarship Chairperson, Coordinator of AB GIRLS and president. I served on the AB Women's Ministries National Leadership Team as Events Coordinator and served as their Coordinator of AB GIRLS as well as serving as the first Coordinator of Missions with Women and Girls. I served as the Samuel Stillman Association AB Women's Ministries president, Coordinator of AB GIRLS, and Coordinator of White Cross.

I led an AB GIRLS mission encounter to the Czech Republic and Bulgaria where we delivered food and distributed chocolate to children in orphanages and we led an AB GIRLS gathering: Sisters to Sisters, co-led with missionary Ray Schellinger an Immigration Immersion Experience to Tijuana, MX, brought greetings from AB Women's Ministries to the congregation in a Burmese Baptist church, wrote Bible studies for AB GIRLS, wrote requests for grants for Dreamer Moms in Tijuana, MX and women in Haiti to receive micro-loans. I participated in a meeting in Washington, DC at the Bread for the World Institute with the focus on When Women Flourish... We Can End Hunger and attended the Commission on the Status of Women at the UN in New York City. I walked in places that Rev. Adoniram Judson and Ann Hasseltine Judson walked and visited Rev. Martin Luther King's birthplace.

From the shy introverted young adult who faced obstacles, with the support, encouragement, and mentoring of AB women and the enabling of the Holy Spirit I believe I became and developed into the person God planned for me to serve His world. My hope is that while serving in AB Women's Ministries that I have helped in building God's faith community. Follow His lead with praise and thanksgiving and watch the blessings come down.

### *From the Tea for Two Kitchen* Rose’s Black Forest Cookies

1 cup all-purpose flour	½ cup sugar
2 Tbs. unsweetened cocoa powder	½ cup brown sugar, packed
1 tsp. baking powder	2 eggs
½ tsp. salt	12 oz. semisweet chocolate chunks
8 oz. semisweet chocolate, chopped	1.5 cups dried cherries
½ cup unsalted butter, cut in pieces	

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line three baking sheets with parchment. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, cocoa, baking powder, and salt. Set aside. Place chopped chocolate and butter in a large heat-proof bowl set over a pan of simmering water. Stir until melted and smooth. Remove from heat. Whisk in sugars, then eggs until smooth.

Whisk in the dry ingredients just until combined (be careful not to overmix.) Fold in chocolate chunks and dried cherries. Press plastic wrap on to the surface of the dough and refrigerate for thirty to forty-five minutes. Drop mounds of dough (equal to two level tablespoons), leaving about two inches between, on to prepared sheets. Bake just until edges are firm, eleven to thirteen minutes. Cool on baking sheets for two to three minutes; then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Recently the American Baptist Women’s Ministries of Massachusetts became an “official” partner with the Massachusetts Baptist Multicultural Ministries (MBMM). I say “official” because we now have it in writing, although AB women have been working to support MBMM through our White Cross requests for several years now.

With this new partnership, we are hoping to continue assisting the new Americans who have come to our shores as strangers, seeking relief from the terrors and dangers encountered in their original homelands.

MBMM is a multi-faceted organization, and it would be impossible for me to touch on its many programs in a brief article. All that information can be found online at [www.mbmm.org](http://www.mbmm.org), which may be overwhelming to view at first because of its scope. What I would like to do is to bring the facts to life by mentioning a few of the personal experiences that have shown me what it means to “show hospitality to strangers.”

Celebration of World Refugee Day with “Backpack Stories” brought to light the experiences of several immigrants leaving their home countries with all their possessions crammed in a backpack. It was amazing to hear of the courage and resilience of these folks, and to know that MBMM was there to help them become adjusted to their new home communities. It is comforting to know that the organization is available to advocate for individuals who are not familiar with our legal procedures and empower them to speak for themselves eventually.

Preparing for celebrations like the New American Christmas offered hands-on mission opportunities, as members of various Baptist churches gathered in early December at FBC Lexington to stuff over 500 bags with items from the White Cross request. Many hands made quick work, and all was complete in about two hours. These bags were destined for families at the New American Christmas Party a couple of days later in Lowell, complete with carol-singing and the arrival of Santa Claus. My favorite times involve the celebration of our diversity, especially involving music and food!

## White Cross

During World War I, women in the church assisted the American Red Cross by providing surgical dressings, bandages, and other medical supplies for U.S. service personnel. As they met these needs, the women became convinced that similar methods would be of great help in the work of Christian missions. In April 1919 American Baptist women organized the White Cross Service League. Later that year, both International Ministries (IM) and AB Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) adopted the White Cross Service program and decided to unite the efforts while keeping two divisions, “overland” and “overseas.” Requests from ABHMS (Overland) and IM (Overseas) were distributed to the Coordinator of White Cross in each region/state, who would breakdown the requests and distribute it to their associations’ Coordinators of White Cross and the associations’ Coordinators of White Cross would breakdown those requests and distribute them to the women’s groups in the local churches.

Through IM, Overseas White Cross supports the work of our missionaries and our mission partners as they serve in programs of health and wellness, evangelism, community service, education and abolishing global slavery. Items requested through Overseas White Cross include birthing kits for the Congo and now baby layettes for Nicaragua. We did not receive a request this year from ABHMS. The ABWM of MA executive committee discussed what could be done to continue to support our White Cross recipient, who is in our own community, Massachusetts Baptist Multicultural Ministries (MBMM), that works at the grassroots level with refugee communities in the areas of advocacy. From this discussion a Partnership Ministry is being developed. Read about it on page 5.

## Partnering Ministry

American Baptist Home Mission Societies has discontinued sending out Overland White Cross requests. The executive committee of AB Women's Ministries of MA discussed what we could possibly do, and we came up with the Partnering Ministry.

Because the Massachusetts Baptist Multicultural Ministries (MBMM) was our White Cross recipient for several years, we wanted to continue providing the much-needed items for the new Americans it serves. MBMM agreed and together we signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on July 29, 2020. We are also working with two other ministries to partner with and will let you know who they are and what their needs are as soon as the MOUs are signed.

The Partnering Ministry enables women's groups, individuals, mission committees and/or churches to support ministries in the TABCOM family, provides choices, gives opportunities to do hands-on-mission, and brings exposure to AB Women's Ministries of Massachusetts, which provides a variety of opportunities.

Since MBMM is member of our Partnering Ministry, they have provided us with a list of requests, which is at the end of the newsletter. Do not get intimidated by the requested quantities. Provide what you can provide. Make a copy of the form and use it as a packing slip.

This is new for us. We may have to tweak the process along the way. But for now, we can continue to help serve new Americans in Massachusetts.
